USI STUDENTS' UNION TRAINING

Each year the Union of Students in Ireland (USI) provides training for elected officers, this year it took place entirely online! The purpose of SUT is to provide full-time officers with the skills required to plan and execute a successful year as a sabbatical officer. Officers receive training in different areas, some specific to individual roles and some general training that will aid all sabbatical officers during their time in office.

Training this year included topics such as student accommodation, students with disabilities, academic representation, team leadership, media training, Ents, marketing & comms, SUSI, The First Year Experience in a COVID-19 Setting, lobbying training, antiracism training and role play casework workshops.

MSU X MU RACE EQUITY PANEL DISCUSSION

This panel was chaired by Kelly Rennick (MSU President) and supported by Dr. Gemma Irvine (MU Vice-President for Equality & Diversity). Guests were Bukky Adebowale (MSU VP Student Life), Tina Adinga (MSU Ethnic Diversity Senator), Senator Eileen Flynn, and Megan Berry (MU Masters Student). The event was opened with a statement from the MU President, Prof. Philip Nolan.

This event was to highlight the importance of talking about race on our campus. With the Black Lives Matter Movement and Traveller Week taking place around this time, this event was to elevate the stories and experiences that are often forgotten.

HOUSE IT GOING?




At the start of the year we put out information around housing and renters rights to help students in looking for accommodation, and in letting them know their rights when in accommodation. We posted multiple Instagram Stories with details of where students could look for accommodation as well as detailing different things students needed to know in relation to their accommodation rights. We also provided students with opportunities to ask questions about what rights they have and raised awareness of supports around Accommodation.

JULY/AUGUST 2020

SUT+

In August the sabbatical officers received round two of student union officer training from USI. Training took place online with officers from around the country. These sessions heavily focused on teaching officers to deal with certain scenarios they could encounter with students & how to respond effectively. The training also aimed to build on officer communication and team working skills and ability to work under pressure!



I'M PLAYING MY PART

The full time officers filmed lots of material with MU for the safe return to campus. This included a walk around the campus video with Kelly, detailing all the new safety measures in place on campus. A video showcasing 'I'm playing my part' was a part of a large media campaign about keeping each other and the wider community of Maynooth safe.

This campaign involved bilingual posters around campus, the town and neighbouring towns, that the MSU President, Kelly, the VP Welfare and Equality, Ciarán, and the Social Science Faculty Convenor, Séan featured in. Kelly also filmed a how to be safe in class tutorial, that was used when needed at the start of lectures when term started.



A MESSAGE FROM THE MSU VP EDUCATION

When running for election, none of the Officers (except Nicole) expected for their term of office to be dominated by a global pandemic. Nonetheless, we took up the mantle from our predecessors and set out to fulfil our constitutional responsibilities, implement our manifestos and venture into the unknown with COVID adaptation.

My fear at the beginning of our term was that the latter would preoccupy or even overwhelm us. I like to read history in my spare time and I discovered a pattern; times of great crisis are also times of great opportunity. The French Belle Epoque, considered to be the golden age of the French Republic, was initiated by the defeat of Napoleon the Third in the Franco-Prussian War of 1870 and the subsequent reforms enacted to recover from the fallout of the war. The reparations imposed on Finland by the Soviet Union following World War II kick started a push towards innovation and industrial growth which resulted in Nokia becoming a giant that dominated the global electronics industry for much of the late twentieth century.

I believe we rose to the challenge. In particular, I am proud of the advancements I've made to Academic Representation in MSU this year. The Academic Officer Team elected the highest number of Reps in the Union's 45 year history, increased the number of students consulted on University Faculty documentation by 4,300%, and ensured every Rep has an opportunity to interact with their Faculty Dean.

MSU WELCOME 2020

Alongside the Orientation Programme run by the University, MSU hosted a parallel programme of activities that welcomed new students to Maynooth. 'Maynooth 2020' helped students get to know the campus before they arrived and provided them with the information and support needed to settle in on campus. This programme was a first of its kind for MSU- a fully online programme of orientation activities that lasted for 3 weeks with a dedicated section of our website hosting all of the resources centrally so that students could access them whenever it suited them.

There were sessions on wellbeing and educational topics that drew attention to the support services available to students. We also detailed how students could get involved with the different extra-curricular activities run by MSU- providing a gateway to meet people and get to know the campus community. This programme was a first of its kind for MSU- a fully online programme of orientation activities that lasted for 3 weeks with a dedicated section of our website hosting all of the resources centrally so that students could access them whenever it suited them.

MAP LAUNCHPAD ORIENTATION

This was an online orientation programme designed to support and ease the transition to third level for students who are coming to Maynooth University through the Higher Education Access Route (HEAR) and/or the Disability Access Route to Education (DARE). Incoming students supported by the Maynooth University Access Programme (MAP) can get to know fellow first years, ask questions and find advice from existing student leaders on how to navigate the University. MSU gave talks and hosted workshops online as part of the Launchpad programme.

'EDUCATION FOR ALL' DAY OF ACTION ONE

Our first day of lobbying for publicly funded education with USI took place on September 21st. MSU called for our members to email their TD's ahead of Budget 2021 to demand a fairer education system. We also took part in a national campaign that involved Tweeting local TD's and the minister for higher education about our experiences with higher education funding, to highlight the barriers students in Ireland are facing.

MSU EVENTS FORECAST

This year was the year for the students & staff of Maynooth to get involved, engaged & empowered! The MSU Events Forecast was a schedule of weekly events for four weeks each semester. It lets students and staff know WHEN and WHAT things are happening and showcases the different types of events within the Maynooth Student Life so that they can be promoted on the MSU socials and event pages!



Various members of Maynooth University & St. Patrick's College Maynooth input their events for the beginning of each semester. It was a central hub where people could simply find an event they were interested in and attend with just a click. Clubs & Societies, Student Services, Departments and so many more contributed to the Events Forecast this year. There were a total of over 100 events imputed into the Events Forecast this year!

MSU X MU PRESENTS ACTIVE CONSENT

Our second Equality & Diversity Series event was held on the 30th September. MSU and MU teamed up to host an online panel discussion on the topic of consent, detailing its importance, how far we've come in Ireland in terms of legislation & education and what we need to work on. The panel was chaired by Bukky Adedbowale (VP Student Life) with support from Gemma Irvine (VP for Equality and Diversity MU). The guests included Kelly Rennick (MSU President), Dr Pádraig MacNeela (NUIG Psychology), Dr Sinéad Ring (MU Law), and Clare Austick (USI VP Welfare). MU support information was delivered by Ciarán Watts (VP Welfare & Equality) and Sam Blackensee (Equality Officer MU).

ACTIVE CONSENT WORKSHOPS

All 4 sabbatical officers received active consent workshop facilitator training in order to host consent workshops that were made available for students to attend online in the first month of term time. We received training from the Active Consent team in NUIG. The sabbatical team delivered almost 30 sessions during the course of the month. The SU teamed up with the office of the VP for Equality and Diversity and many other departments to facilitate these workshops and they will continue every year from now on!

GET CONNECTED



Kelly & Ciarán teamed up with MU's Access office on Get Connected, a campaign that gave students tips and tricks for improving their internet access while studying from home from October 1st-7th. The campaign also included the financial support services available at Maynooth University for device & connectivity funding. The campaign also launched MSU's partnered approach in promoting MU's Laptop Loan Scheme, a government funded scheme to ensure students had access to laptops to do their studies.

SHAG WEEK 1



During SHAG Week 1 we raised awareness around Sexual Health while also running some fun events for students to attend during the week. We ran Consent Workshops all week long, and as well as this we ran Safe Sex, Queer Sex Ed, Porn Literacy, Menstruation Hygeine and Kink Education Workshops and hosted the Big Sex Quiz! SHAG Week is a great opportunity to raise awareness and educate Maynooth students about practising safe sex, sexual identity and expression and learning the importance and necessity of consent. This campaign is an educational programme which promotes safe sex in a fun and effective way. We also strive to have informative classes throughout the year on safe sex, consent, sexual expression and sexual empowerment and provide information and signpost supports.

FIRST MSU CLUBS COUNCIL OF THE YEAR

The very first clubs council began with members sharing their fears and excitement for the year. Elections for the MSU Student Senate subcommittees took place here. Members Aaron Thornton (Shotokan Karate Club) and Seán Keane (Surf Club were elected onto the student senate. Michael Grant (Volleyball Club) was elected on the Constitutional Representative Review Committee of the Student Senate. Robert McCabe (Athletics Club) was elected as both secretary and member of the Entertainments Committee of the Student Senate.

FIRST MSU SOCIETIES COUNCIL OF THE YEAR

The very first societies council took place as one of the longest councils in the history of councils. Like clubs, each member shared their fears and excitement about the year ahead. Elections for the MSU Student Senate subcommittees took place here. Members Lucas Jeanniot (Games Society) and David Dyksy (Social Democrats Society) were elected onto the Student Senate. Ryan Lynch (Access Society) was elected onto both the Constitutional Representative Review Committee of the Student Senate and the Entertainments Committee of the Student Senate. Gavin Fanning (Hogwarts Society) was elected as the secretary of the Societies Council.

A MESSAGE FROM THE MSU VP WELFARE & EQUALITY

It's safe to say that this year didn't go the way I had hoped when I originally set out to re-run for the role of VP Welfare and Equality. Having been lucky enough to have gotten a semester on-campus last year, I definitely missed getting to meet students in person and getting to run events on-campus but like everyone else we had to adapt to the online environment.

I tried to make myself as available to students as possible by running online drop-in hours during the year, and tried to run online campaigns and events during the year to try keep that aspect of the student experience alive in the online world. I was super proud of the engagement with all of the online campaigns, and was also humbled to have the SHAG week campaign shortlisted for the USI SAAIs.

It wasn't the usual scenario of students popping their head in the door to chat to me or me running around campus with a shopping trolley full of condoms, but I have to say I did enjoy it all the same!

The lack of on-campus students also meant that we had an opportunity to push for development of on-campus facilities to be implemented, which led to the implementation of plans for more gender neutral toilets on campus, and improvements to the physical health facilities on campus, which I have been proud to have helped develop.

I'm also super proud of the team this year, in how we worked together and functioned as a team. I've been on quite a few Executive teams, and one fear I had at the start of the year was that if we didn't have the same time to bond in person as with previous sabbat teams and executive teams that we wouldn't be able to function as a team when under pressure, however I think that the Executive really came together this year and worked extremely well together all year long.

My stand out moments of the year would definitely be developing the representative roles on our Student Senate, through helping bring in the position of Mincér Senator and Parents and Carers Senator to increase representation in our governance structures, but mostly in beginning the work to split the role of VP Welfare and Equality into two full time positions, to ensure that all the issues that students face in both the welfare and equality remits get the time and attention they deserve.

It was a tough year, with a lot of long nights, and days when it was difficult to pull myself out of bed, but knowing that getting up in the morning meant getting to work to make the lives of students better was a light during these difficult times that helped keep me going, and I am so grateful for that. Overall, although it wasn't the end to my time in the Students' Union that I foresaw six years ago when I became First Year Rep, it was one to remember!

MSU X LEAD VOTER REGISTRATION INFORMATION



Kelly dedicated a week to informing students on how to get registered to vote in national elections, with Julian educating students on how to register for Seanad Elections from November 9th - 13th. A station was set up in the SU Information Centre with forms printed off for each election and students could hand them in to be posted by our Front Office Manager, Ann Marie.

LEAD made infographics to break down local & national elections, the Dáil & Seanad, and The President & referenda. LEAD also hosted a live episode on voter information with special guest Marie Lyons (VP for Equality & Citizenship USI) MSU also launched a national call for online accessible voter registration for every county in Ireland.

SEE THE ABILITY



During the See the Ability week we collaborated with the MU Access Society to raise awareness around disabilities among the student population. We ran Zoom Chats, Watch Parties, a Quiz and a Discussion panel all centered around raising awareness of the issues faced by students with disabilities.

STUDENT SENATE PROMO CAMPAIGN



MSU Student Senate is the highest decision making body of Maynooth Students' Union. Its main role is to set out policies for the Union, and to oversee the work that it does. Updates to the general student population of the activity of the Senate had been uncoordinated for some time, so this campaign aimed to change this. A graphic update style and schedule was introduced with the aim of highlighting the main talking points and decisions from Senate within 48 hours of each meeting.

GOOD MORNING MAYNOOTH



MSU's first talkshow was a project created by the MSU VP Student Life Bukky to transform what would be a coffee morning into something innovative for virtual student life. This project was a collaboration between the MSU VP Student Life Bukky Adebowale, VP Welfare & Equality Ciarán Watts and the MU Chaplain Ciarán Coughlan. On the 4th of November, the first episode "Let's Be Honest: We're in a Global Pandemic Y'all" was released with great success. The project then transitioned into a podcast which can now be streamed on all podcast platforms including Facebook and YouTube!

FIRST SITTING OF THE FIFTH SESSION OF THE MSU STUDENT SENATE (09.11.20)



ENVIRONMENTAL PLAN OF WORK

This year MSU developed their first ever environmental plan of work dedicated to environmental and sustainability activism & education. It's goals included having an environmental update as a standing item on our MSU Student Senate Agenda, where our green campus senator could update on MSU's sustainability initiatives and climate news students should be aware of, supporting and collaborating with Maynooth Green Campus, lobbying MU for environmental electives, educating students to be active citizens, hosting a sustainable fashion week and green week and much more!

MSU ACADEMIC REP TRAINING

Once Academic Reps got elected, the Academic Officer Team set about providing them with the skills and knowledge they would need to excel in their roles. Three sets of training were provided. The first was a general training that featured speakers like Professor Colin Graham, Dr Susan Gottlöber and Clare Austick (President-elect of the Union of Students in Ireland). The second set was the National Student Engagement Programme (NStEP) Class Rep training, delivered by the wonderful NStEP Student Trainers. The final training was around aiding student life in the remote learning environment where Reps developed skills to create a community within their class groups.

SPCM STUDENT FORUMS

This MSU focused on improving engagement with students of St. Patrick's College Maynooth (SPCM) and in turn learning how to be better representatives for SPCM students. We hosted SPCM student forums to hear about the changes needed and how we could get students more involved with us. This led to MSU hosting their first ever SPCM dedicated Student Life events and SPCM students designing a Good Morning Maynooth Episode. MSU successfully elected SPCM Academic reps and an SPCM Senator was elected to Student Senate with another student elected for the position next year too, this was a massive success as the position has been vacant for some time. MSU also hosted an SPCM awareness campaign so MU students could learn more about the life of SPCM students.

SUSTAINABLE FASHION WEEK



SECOND MSU CLUBS & SOCIETIES COUNCILS OF THE YEAR



END IBSA



MSU released a statement condemning IBSA in support of victims in Ireland focused on educating students on the harmful effects of IBSA while committing to lobbying for legislation against it. Senators came together to draft policy to ensure MSU's attendance at the national online protest organised by End IBSA on November 28th. MSU created virtual protest signs students could share on their social media on the day to support the call for legislation and aided students drafting emails to their local TDs.

MSU attended USI Pink Training with a number of students to learn more about the issues that affect LGBTQIA+ individuals. MSU CHARITY PARTNER OF THE YEAR SELECTION

The selection of the MSU Charity Partner of the Year (CPY) was done in a new fashion this year with three stages: Application and nominations, shortlist then finally, selection. The nomination panel was selected who then shortlisted six nominated charities to two. The Selection of the CPY was done by secret ballot vote at the first sitting of the MSU Student Senate. The MSU Charity Partner of the Year 2020/21 was chosen to be the Multiple Sclerosis Society Ireland.

CHARITY WEEK



Charity Week was held on 7-10th of December and kicking it off was Bingo Loco! Throughout the week there were various events from Clubs and Societies and the MSU Student Engagement Ambassadors. This included a movie watch party, a Club & Socs Quiz and more! All the insanity of Bingo Loco was brought to students living rooms on December 7th as we hosted Bingo Loco TV! This event was the headline event for Charity Week and was brought to you by MSU & Life Credit Union in aid of our Charity Partner MS Ireland. Yes, we played bingo- but not as you know it! LOBBYING FOR ACTION ON THE 2020 CLIMATE BILL

MSU officers and members attended a national protest on December 7th to lobby local TDs for Action on the 2020 Climate Bill. The protest involved intimate online meetings with 4x North Kildare TDs to discuss how the Bill was too vague and contained many loopholes. Ireland's climate law is important because only a strong law will ensure every Department across Government takes climate change seriously, we wanted to start a dialogue with local TDs to improve Ireland's urgency with tackling climate change!

12 DAYS OF CHRISTMAS DRAWS

As a result of Covid-19, our usual 12 Days of Christmas Free Prize Draw took on a somewhat different format. We asked students to follow a link provided on our socials to enter, via a Google Doc form. We now had our MSU Four Weeks of Christmas 'Remote' Free Prize Draw! Each Thursday during the month of December we held multiple draws with the finale, hosted by our MSU President Kelly Rennick, held in "Your Space". This took on a live stream format which was posted on our socials



With well over 1000 students entering, there were a total of 17 contributors giving us a total of 48 prizes. These prizes included, Hampers, Student Leap Card vouchers, One 4 All vouchers, Book Shop vouchers, power-banks, hoodies, chocolates, etc. the list was amazing. A huge "thank you" to all our partners/suppliers who donated, without you this event simply would not happen. Let's hope next year's event can return to normal and be bigger and better as we say goodbye to Covid..

ANNUAL CHRISTMAS TREE LIGHTING AT THE SU

MSU collaborated with the international office to deliver small Christmas events with international students on campus. MSU officers met them in groups of 10 to turn on the lights, listen to Christmas music and have hot chocolate. We also live streamed the main event for students, the MSU President Kelly gave a speech before turning on the lights for the last time. The officers also filmed a Christmas message to wish all our members a happy holiday season!

'EDUCATION FOR ALL' DAY OF ACTION 2

The national second day of action took place on December 16th with USI releasing a video with messaging from student union officers around the country calling for a more accessible education system. This day of action focused on educating our members why publicly funded education is needed and what the system used to look like when it was properly funded by the government in previous years. MSU also created a demo with our executive team holding up statements about Ireland's education system and the need for change, which was uploaded on social media. Many of our members also took part in this action creating their own demos and crafting signs at home!

THIRD MSU CLUBS COUNCIL OF THE YEAR

At this council there was a recap of the previous recommendations and updates on their progress. The recommendations had encouraged more support for clubs in training and their future endeavours.

A mini survey also took place:

Of those who attended the MSU Councils in previous years, in comparison to those councils, how have the councils improved?

- 21.4% said a great deal
- 50% said a lot



DESTRESS MAYNOOTH



Stress levels can be higher than usual around exam time, especially with students completing assessment mostly online. While a bit of stress can help for students to stay motivated and focused, too much can be pretty unhelpful. We built on our previous award winning DeStress Maynooth campaigns to deliver an online programme of activities aiming to lower stress levels and help students achieve the best academic grades that they can. Workshops included; reaching out to supports; getting the last assignments in; preparing for exams; and taking breaks.

STUDENTSURVEY.IE PROMO

StudentSurvey.ie and PGR StudentSurvey.ie are designed to focus on student engagement, namely the amount of time and effort that students put into meaningful and purposeful educational activities, and the extent to which institutions provide such opportunities and encourage students to engage with them.We worked very closely with the University to improve increase uptake of the survey with our VP Education Julian organising students to conduct promotion online and distributing Goody Bag prizes via social media.

WOMEN LEAD



Women Lead is an annual conference hosted by USI to empower women and non binary people to take up leadership positions. This year it took place online on January 29th & 30th with Kelly and Bukky bringing a group of 20 aspiring leaders from MSU. We heard from many inspiring women about what it's like at the top and from female sabbatical officers around the country. There were also lots of great workshops on running campaigns online & creating a manifesto to achieve your goals!

EMPOWER: EMPOWERING ETHNIC MINORITIES

EMpower is an annual conference of just two years, hosted by USI to inspire ethic minorities to be leaders of the future. As most events did, it took place online from 12th to 13th February. This event was in partnership with Black & Irish and iNAR. Both Julian and Bukky led a group of seven students from various ethnic backgrounds to this event. There were various sessions such as 'Minorities in Leadership' by Dr. Ebun Joseph, 'Getting Ahead with Social Media' by Angel Arutua and 'Presenting Yourself in an Online World' by Eric Ehigie.

STUDENT SUPPORTER TRAINING





MSU LONDIS



The shop staff returned mid summer 2020 in anticipation of some activity on campus in September. The shop layout was adjusted to allow for one way traffic and floor decals were put in place to allow for social distancing. At the entrance we installed a sanitising station and in addition, we erected perspex screens at each till point to ensure best practice was being followed. We reconfigured the coffee station, again to allow for social distancing and reduced the number of touch points by sourcing new milk dispensers.

It soon became apparent that students were not going to be back on campus but it was great to see some of our first years for orientation albeit, a very low key orientation. Unfortunately, we were not able to recruit a new team last year but we felt it was important to keep MSU Londis open to offer a service to students who wanted to avail of any on campus facilities.

After Christmas, The John Hume Building became a key resource for students and we were delighted to be able to continue offering our much loved Seattle Best coffee and hot chocolate during the busy exam period. Again, we had hoped for more on campus activity for semester two but unfortunately it wasn't to be. With further lockdowns and level five restrictions MSU felt it was important to keep MSU Londis open and the team were more than happy to do so.

MSU londis are proud to be one of the only on campus services to remain open during this awful year and hope it confirms our dedication to offer our students the best service we can. SHAG WEEK






FOURTH SITTING OF THE FIFTH SESSION OF THE MSU STUDENT SENATE (17.02.21)

POSTGRADUATE LIFE PANEL





The aim of the forum is to provide a safe space to ethnic minority students on campus and allow for change led by these students to happen for the future. The event highlighted a number of areas needed to be addressed. This included things like staff awareness & university support, discrimination and micro-aggressions, inclusion, racism, the diversification and decolonisation of curricula and the future of the forum. It was a huge success as one of the very first student organised and student led discussions. It has since then contributed to a report which outlines a number of recommendations going forward.

USI ACCOMMODATION BILL

Many of our communication activities and developments were in response to the recommendations of the strategy alongside manifesto aims of the elected officer team. In a pandemic year, our online communications were more important than in ensuring that we are provid content that students have interest in, want to engage with, and will ultimately inform and entertain our membership.

This year saw us introduce new communications measures such as Student Senate Updates, social media takeovers, regular update emails, and enhanced usage of our website. In particular, we placed significant emphasis on raising the awareness of the Officer team and how the various representative structures serve to represent the student body.

SIXTH MSU CLUBS & SOCIETIES COUNCILS OF THE YEAR

Clubs Council: The last and final Clubs Council of 2021! In this council we reflected on the year, goals and accomplishments made! MSU is proud of the work that clubs have done as a whole. Without their sport, it has been a tough year however, they all pulled through much better than even they expected. We ended the year with a quiz, as you do!

Societies Council: The last and final Societies Council of 2021! Another reflection was done to appreciate how far societies have grown in the year! It has been wonderful to see how students have come together as a community in the midst of the year.

'EDUCATION FOR ALL' DAY OF ACTION 3

USI's education for all day of action was held as a virtual protest & took place to fight against fees and rent on March 24th. MSU members were out in force that day representing on the zoom call with 200 students around the country and clogging Twitter's timeline with calls for a fairer deal for students in Ireland. During the protest we heard from student leaders and experts about what's wrong with the higher education system and what's needed to make it more accessible to all!

TRANSGENDER DAY OF VISIBILITY

On Transgender Day of Visibility the MSU Executive joined with other SUs around the country in showing support for our Trans and Non-Binary students and calling for better Trans Healthcare in Ireland. We did this by emailing our local TDs, creating an online demonstration and tweeting!

MIGRANTS MINDS MATTER

The Migrants Minds Matter campaign with USI, the Movement of Asylum Seekers in Ireland (MASI) and student justice and equality organisation, STAND launched in November 2020 aimed at campaigning for an end to Direct Provision and seeked to promote equal access to third-level education and supports for those living in Direct Provision. Events took place throughout the year to spread awareness but in March 2021 SU officers met with students living in Direct Provision to see what we could further do to support them while also campaigning for removal of barriers to education across social media as international protection applicants in higher education must be in the direct provision system for three years before they can avail of third-level grants & must pay international rate fees if they cannot avail of grants. The campaign also involved selling t-shirts and tote bags where all proceeds would go to an education fund for students in Direct Provision.

MU SPORTS FACILITIES DEVELOPMENT SURVEY



March 2021 saw the execution of a MU Sports Facilities survey instrument prepared by Maynooth Students' Union. Over 1,000 students from across the population participated in this survey, contributing to a valuable data set on how students engage with the sports facilities on campus. The aim of this survey was to gather student feedback which MSU will present to Maynooth University to inform the development of a Sports Strategy and assist decision-making regarding proposed Student Levy spending. In particular, this survey gathered feedback and opinion on the proposed development of sports and recreational facilities and redevelopment and expansion of the sports centre.

USI CONGRESS

MSU took part in the Annual USI Congress representing our members in debates and policy decisions for the national students' union's policy stances. MSU had 14 delegates attend the virtual conference. MSU proposed and spoke on many motions over the course of the Congress and made sure to represent our members' interests in the best possible way. We also saw the election of our own VP Student Life Bukky Adebowale as the new USI Vice President Equality and Citizenship!

GREEN WEEK

Green Week, organised by the MSU VP Student Life, was held from 19th-23rd April 2021. There were events and conversations to continue the narrative around the climate crisis. Some of these events included an Instagram Live Climate Conversation with USI VP Equality & Citizenship, Marie Lyons.

Good Morning Maynooth was a special episode that week with guest speakers and climate activists Theresa Rose Sebastian and Aoife Hynes. In episode 10, "The Climate Crisis: Why Don't People Care?". It was one of the best Good Morning Maynooth episodes, jam packed with topics ranging from decolonisation, privilege and the big & little changes.

MSU'S FASTEST FUNDRAISER



The goal was to break away from traditional running challenges as this isn't always appealing to everyone! Each officer is passionate about different things so the challenge was split where four teams went head-to-head.

The Pink team: 'Get skilled with Bukky' was a group that focused on hobbies such as (roller) skating, learning a new instrument, Rubik's cube solving, or even yoga. It's a mix of moving and brainpower! This team was supported by Student Engagement Ambassadors Michaela Waters, Cara McMahon and Charity Senator Abigail Goldrick.

The Green Team: 'Get sharp with Julian' focused on a number of challenges that involved things like reading a certain number of books in the month, learning a new language or even completing computer games! Yellow Team: Get Fit With Ciarán is based on fitness challenges such as burpee, skipping rope or crunch challenges etc. This team was supported by Student Engagement Ambassadors Astrid Abissath, Alie Martin and Natasha Fogarty.

The Blue Team was the Fastest Fundraiser with €2100 raised, Pink Team in second with €510, Green Team in third with €310 and Yellow team in fourth with €290.

NATIONAL SURVEY OF STUDENT EXPERIENCES OF SEXUAL VIOLENCE & SEXUAL HARASSMENT



In April MSU partnered again with the office of the VP for Equality & Diversity to encourage students to take part in the National Survey of Student Experiences of Sexual Violence & Sexual Harassment. Kelly interviewed Sam Blanckensee, the Equality officer in MU about the benefits of taking part in the survey for feeding into national policy and how it will cause an impact on actions of local institutions on the ground. MSU released informational content with trigger warnings encouraging students only to take part if they felt they could!

USI STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT AWARDS IRELAND

The Student Achievement Awards, now in its eighth year, is the annual opportunity for the student movement in Ireland to recognise the contribution of students to improving the experience of their fellow students, and to wider society.
